#### **Research questions**

- What works for whom, how, and under which circumstances in the DMMH intervention?
  - $\rightarrow$ Mechanisms
  - →Context factors
  - $\rightarrow$ Outcomes
- Which strategies work for whom, how, and under which circumstances in the **implementation of the DMMH intervention**?



#### Hypotheses - Analyses

Developing, testing and refining the programme theories with all hypotheses regarding theory of change (Punton et al., 2016):

- 1. Logic model of the intervention
- 2. Logic model of the implementation







- Subsample from the experimental condition
- 40 service users, 40 clinicians, and 40 team leads (10 per country)
- Qualitative interview (1 hour)



#### Rationale



- **Realist evaluation approach**: What works, for whom, in what respects, to what extent, in what contexts, and how (Westhorp et al., 2011).
- Combined with a 'non-adoption, abandonment, scale-up, spread, and sustainability' (NASSS): Examination of interactions of contexts, mechanisms, and outcomes involved in the programme (Jagosh, 2019).
